Woman awarded \$115,000 in sex abuse case

She sued Dimmit man who seduced her as a teen a few years ago.

A Dimmit County jury has awarded more than \$100,000 to a young woman who was seduced three years ago as a teenager by a man who judged her band con-

John F. Ralston, 54, of Carrizo Springs, was already a registered sex offender in Texas, having pleaded guilty last year to statutory rape in the same mat-

ter:
The civil case against Ralston was filed by a female identified in court papers only as DJA. In the lawsuit, she said she contracted herpes and another sexually transmitted disease from Ralston when she was 16 and that she suffered emotionally from the experience.

"This case was never about the money. It was about DJA wanting to make sure it didn't happen to any other girls," said her lawyer, Alex Katzman of San

Besides \$100,000 in compensa-

DJA \$15,000 in punitive damages in a verdict reached last week. Ralston's lawyer, Alfredo Pa-

dilla of Carrizo Springs, said the jury gave the plaintiff far less than she wanted.
"They were asking for \$750,000

plus punitive damages," he said. Testimony at the trial suggested that Ralston had a similar relationship with an underage girl

a decade earlier The father of another young girl testified that Ralston apparently had a sexual relationship

with his daughter, and that on her 17th birthday she moved in with Ralston," Katzman said. In Ralston's testimony, he ac-

knowledged the rela with DJA but little else. relationship

"He blamed the parents, saying they should have known what was going on," Katzman

DJA testified that she met Ralston in August 2006 after singing in a battle of the bands event in Carrizo Springs. She said Ral-ston, who was a judge, offered to help her with her music.

"He was a typical sexual predator. He ingratiated himself with the family to gain access to the child," Katzman said.

He said the girl had never had boyfriend before becoming involved with Ralston

When she told her mother some months later, her mother went to police, leading to Ral-ston's indictment and convic-

Katzman said DJA, now 19, is still struggling with the experi-

"She's been very depressed. She's trying to get her'life back on track. She hopes to go to col-

lege some day," he said.
"After the trial, I told her I was proud of her for having the guts to come forward." he said.

Robert Davis was the last SAPD officer killed in the line of duty. The 26year-old former Marine died Dec. 1

Davis had been clearing flares from a West Side traffic accident Side traffic accident scene when his colleague, Officer David Seaton, drove through an intersection at a speed be-tween 98 and 102 mph before striking another vehicle and pinning Davis beneath the patrol car. Seaton, 43, has been suspended indefinitely, and the Police Department has recommended manslaughter charges be filed. The recommendation has been forwarded to a grand jury, and a decision might be made next month, according to prosecutors.

Davis' wife, Simona, sat among other griefwidows stricken and wept quietly as another officer read aloud names of each fallen officer. She placed a pin with Davis' name onto a flag with names of the other fallen

San Antonio officers.
"It doesn't get any easier," said Grace Lopez, the wife of Officer Valen-

tine Lopez Jr. Her husband died, in long-term after health problems due to injuries he suffered when gunman shot him in

the abdomen in 1977. "It's really difficult because my husband died during memorial week," Lopez said.

Texas Open pulls in \$8 million for kids

The Valero Texas Open likely has kept alive one of the most impressive winning streaks on the PGA

By raising \$8 million in charity funds in the face of intimidating economic hurdles, the historic tournament is almost assured of retaining its position as one of the top altruistic events on the schedule.

"I can't think of a better accolade to have on the tour," Rich Marcogliese, executive vice president of

Valero Energy Corp., said Tuesday in officially announcing the figure at the pairings party for the Oak

Farms Dairy Pro-Am.

The Open, a fixture on the PGA Tour since 1922, has been among the top five on the men's tour in charity fundraising for five straight years. It was in the top two among all tournaments in 2007 and

The funds are raised annually through sponsorships sold during the Open and the Valero Benefit for Children Golf Classic. This year's Texas Open will be held Thursday through Sunday at the Resort Course at La Cantera, with the Golf Classic set for Monday at 10 area courses. The \$8 million raised

since the last Texas Open, held in October, will be donated to children's charities selected by Valero employees at the 16 refineries and one credit card center where the company does business, along with its San Antonio headquar-

Since taking over as title sponsor beginning with the 2002 tournament, Valero has raised an average of million

"We thought that this would be an average year, with about that amount," Valero spokesman Bill Day said Tuesday. "But it turn-ed out we went way above average."

An 8-foot piece of the fence came through the passenger's side door, impaling Corcoran and partially ejecting him from the truck, Noe said.

The group searched for her and called the Sheriff's Department minutes later when they couldn't find her. Jordan said responders

found her body under a nearby boat dock.

Senate replaces fee at strip clubs

AUSTIN - The Texas Senate voted Tuesday to repeal a \$5-per-person admission fee on strip clubs, part of which went to a fund to help sex assault victims, and agreed to replace it with a new tax on sexually oriented business.

The bill now goes to Gov. Rick Perry.

A judge's ruling that the strip dub admission fee was unconstitutional is under

The new tax would total 10 percent of gross admissions receipts at adult busi-nesses that charge an admission fee. But some advocates for victims say the businesses would not be required to charge admission and could sharply reduce the money collected.

Change to tobacco tax advances

AUSTIN --- The Texas House has approved changing a tax on smokeless tobacco to fund a loan repayment program for doctors working in underserved ar-

Such tobacco currently is taxed as a percent of the list price of each container. The bill approved 82-59 by lawmakers Tuesday would instead tax products according to weight at \$1.22 per ounce.

Doctors who work in underserved areas for at least a year can apply for help repaying their medical school loans. Additional funds raised from the tax change would go to the repayment program.

The measure faces a final vote in the House before it

Student voter bill approved in House

AUSTIN — Texas House members narrowly ap-proved legislation Tuesday that would allow high school principals to appoint four deputy registrars to help 18-year-old students register to vote.

The measure, which requires Senate approval, passed 75-71. Only one Democrat voted against the bill. Only two Republicans supported it.

Republicans expressed concern that registering students could turn partisan.
